Purposeful Pets

Owning a pet has many advantages, such as looking forward to getting home just to see a fluffy animal, a quiet swimming creature, or a pet mouse. Having an exhausting day is not fun, but maybe when a little voice in your head reminds you, "Hey, I'll get to see my dog soon," you'll find it easier to get through the day.

According to research, interacting with pets has shown to decrease cortisol (a stress-related hormone). Owning a pet may decrease loneliness and increase positivity. Specially trained pets are even used in hospitals or nursing homes to reduce patients' stress and anxiety. *"If someone is struggling with something, they know how to sit there and be loving"* - Dr Ann Berger, a physician and researcher at the News In Health Clinical Center in Bethesda Maryland. Did you know that dogs can also assist in a classroom? A study found that dogs can help children with ADHD to focus better. A study was done that included two groups of children diagnosed with ADHD who participated in group therapy sessions for 12 weeks. One group of children read to a therapy dog once a week for 30 minutes while the second group read to puppets that resembled dogs. The kids who read to the real animals showed better social skills. This means that the children did better with sharing and cooperating, and they had fewer behavioral problems. *"Animals can become a way of building a bridge for those social interactions,"* says Dr. James Griffin, a child development expert. ("The Power of Pets | NIH NEWS in Health")

Lia Mena- "I'm going to miss my friends. I'm looking forward to graduating."


Sarah Dominguez- "I'm going to miss the teachers; I'm looking forward to going to high school."


What's Happening?



BLISSFUL BAKING

Betty Crocker
Dulce de Leche
Cake Recipe

Ingredients

Cake

1/3 Cup butter (Do not use margarine.)

1 box Betty Crocker Super Moist butter recipe yellow cake mix

1 cup water

2 teaspoons vanilla

3 eggs

Frosting

1 can (13.4 oz) dulce de leche (caramelized sweetened condensed milk)

1 package (8 oz.) cream cheese, softened

½ cup whipping cream

Steps for Preparing Cake

1. Heat oven to 350° F (325° F for dark nonstick pan). Grease or spray the bottom ONLY of 13x9 inch pan.
2. In a 1-quart saucepan, heat butter over medium heat for 4-6 minutes. Stir frequently, until golden brown. Remove from heat and let cool for 15 minutes.
3. In a large bowl, beat cake mix, browned butter, water, vanilla, and eggs with electric mixer at low speed for 30 seconds. Then mix at medium speed for 2 minutes (brown flecks from butter will appear in batter). Pour batter into pan.
4. Bake as directed on box for 13x9 inch pan. Cool completely for about 1 hour.
5. In a large bowl, beat dulce de leche and cream cheese with electric mixer at high speed for about 2 minutes, until blended and smooth. Beat in whipping cream until stiff peaks form. Spread frosting over cooled cake. Serve immediately or refrigerate until serving. Store loosely covered in refrigerator.
