Girls Basketball



Have you ever felt as if you should give up? Motivational speaker, Tom Morris, shared his story on the 4th of February at the Hazleton Elementary Middle School. Although his story contained hardships it was one of resilience. Tom Morris showed how having a positive mindset can help you through anything. Having confidence in yourself and a positive attitude is key. Tom Morris shared how his life took a severe change when a mountain bike riding accident left him paralyzed from the chest down. Morris had multiple moments where he could have given up and let his accident define him, but he chose to fight through it. He discussed how a positive mindset is a huge factor in overcoming any negative way his situation is viewed. Although he got frustrated and angry in many moments, his overall positive attitude led him to see the future that was waiting for him.

Morris made other great points as well. For example, he discussed

how important sleep is for us. He shared on the projection screen statistics about sleep. He said 60% of middle school students do not get the recommended 8-10 hours of sleep. He explained that students who get fewer than 7 hours of sleep per night are twice as likely to struggle in school. Also, students are three times more likely to experience symptoms of depression when not getting enough sleep. His advice on getting enough sleep needs to be taken more seriously by students.

On his website, tommorrisperformance.com, he offers a course designed to help others gain the skills needed to handle life's changes. On this site he says, "I'm here to equip you with the skills to not just handle change but also embrace it as an incredible opportunity to become the best version of yourself." His advice is an inspiration and teaches us that we can thrive in any situation, even when things seem impossible. The word "can" will give hope even in the



toughest situations. We also learned that we should be grateful for what we have as our life can take a drastic turn when you least expect it.

Currently Tom Morris is the Assistant Athletic Director for High Performance at Penn State University. This shows how much he has grown by having a positive attitude. He never gave up even when it seemed impossible for him to thrive. He may have lost his ability to walk and ride a traditional bike, but he has not allowed that to define him. He has found other ways to enjoy the things he loves. And he is doing these things very successfully. We are proud to have had Mr. Morris at our school and wish him the best in his adventures of making a positive impact on others.

High School Choices by Criscany Diaz and Esther Alcantara

When students are in 8th grade, they need to choose which high school they would like to spend the next 4 years of their life preparing for their future. Though it may be tedious, it's a very important decision. This article will help to better inform students and prepare them to make that decision! HASD offers a variety of program studies depending on student interests and what they would like to do in the future. High School choices include:

Hazleton Area Academy of Science (STEM): This high school is mostly specialized in software development, mechanical engineering, and computer science. It's classes include life science topics like genetics, botany, zoology, and ecology. It offers a variety of different learning opportunities including project-based learning, individual or group work, and many other creative ways for students to demonstrate their knowledge in a way they would be most comfortable. After attending this high school, students would be ready to specialize in fields such as biotechnology, biochemistry, or any job that uses analytical skills and a strong foundation of math or science. To apply for this high school, you must complete an online test, maintain a strong academic record in your math and science grades, and possibly get teachers recommendations.

Hazleton Area Arts & Humanities Academy (HAAH): This is

one of our most creative high schools. It is a specialized program for students looking forward to arts education or college and career presentations. The HAAH program showcases individual students' creative spirits. It allows students to shine academically through their artistic talents. Categories for placement include: Visual Arts, Drama, Dance, Vocal Music, Instrumental Music, and Communication Arts. To apply to any of these studios students need to submit an application and audition.

Hazleton Area Career Center (HACC): This is a specialized school that helps students learn and be college/career ready. It also gives students a chance to earn college credits. The HACC offers 18 approved programs designed to prepare students for both college and career paths. These programs include: Auto Technology, Broadcast Communications, Child Care, Collision Repair Tech, Computer Aided Drafting (CAD), Construction Tech, Cosmetology, Culinary Arts, Dental Assistant, Diesel Tech, Electrical Tech, Computer Systems Networking, Health Careers, HVAC, Law Enforcement, Nurse Assistant, Precision Machine Tech, and Welding Tech. To enroll in a HACC program, students must complete the Hazleton Area School District's

online registration process.

Hazleton Area High School (HAHS): This is the traditional high school that offers traditional classes and a variety of elective classes. Students also have the opportunity to take dual enrollment operations, which are college-level classes that can be taken while still in high school to earn college credits toward a certain degree. Some other classes offered include Honors Psychology, Honors Sociology, and Honors Statistics, along with many other elective courses like the African American History and the French Revolution. Students will automatically be placed in this school if you are not accepted into any of the above schools.

In Hazleton, students are lucky to have these high school options. Note that the above info was taken from the school's website: www.hasdk12.org.

Also, if students are interested in sports, they may join the high school sports teams regardless of which school they attend. It's never too soon for students to start thinking about which school they would like to go to. Regardless, students should behave and try to get good grades because maybe they'll want to apply to one of the schools that has those requirements.

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Book Buddies by Jaslyn Pena

The book club of the castle deserves some recognition. As expected, Book club does read novels. Members of the Book club are able to choose the novels they would like to read. They discuss what they are reading with others, and they can also share their perspectives of the book. Book club is a great club if you want to improve your social skills. This club involves more than you may realize. In addition to reading and discussing novels, they can be part of a neat program called Book Buddies. The club advisor, Mrs. Dudeck, provided us with some great information:

The goal of our HEMS Book Buddies Program is to pair elementary students with middle school students to foster a love of reading. The program runs from October through March, with middle school students volunteering during one class per week. (Note-Our middle school members are responsible for mak-

ing up work they missed during the class that was missed.) This year the following eight students volunteered: Jaslyn Pena, Criscany Diaz, Celinee Lora, Marilenny Garcia, Drianna Medina, Crisleidy Sanchez, Betsabe Cruz, and Franchely Cabrera Castillo. Peer mentoring has many benefits for all involved. For our younger students, working with a middle schooler helps build reading fluency skills and comprehension. Younger students find middle schoolers relatable and look up to them as role models. The to-one additional practice helps the younger students to build confidence in their reading and writing capabilities.

Peer mentoring is rewarding for our middle school volunteers, as well. There is a great sense of self-satisfaction when helping others. Our volunteers develop useful problem-solving skills, acquire leadership techniques, and enhance their communication skills. Volunteers form close bonds with the younger students. Overall, the experience



leads to a stronger school community and a deep sense of pride.

In the book club, you can build strong friend-ships with some of the 3rd graders through book buddies, and you can also make new friends through discussing novels. 


