day, she thought he was dead.







White-Nose Syndrome

One bat eats thousands of mosquitos and crop-destroying insects per evening.

White-Nose Syndrome is an upcoming disease in North America spread by bats. This disease has killed millions of bats in the United States and Canada. There is a distinctive fungal growth near the muzzle and the wings while they are hibernating. It was discovered February 2006 on a photo taken in a cave from Schoharie County, New York. Since then the disease has been rapidly spreading. By early



2018, it has been discovered in 33 U.S. states and 7 Canadian provinces and the fungus was found in 3 more states. Mostly the disease is found in the eastern side of the world, but in March 2016 a little brown bat with the syndrome was found in Washington.

This syndrome is caused by a fungus called Pseudogymnoascus destructants which spread on the bats skin. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Services strongly recommends removing dangerous substances from your clothing or equipment in such areas after use. The National Speleological Society has an update page to keep caverns apprised of current events.

Bats are significant in everyday life. They help protect many of the fruits we enjoy today. If bats would perish or become extinct, farmers would pay \$74 per acre on insecticides. Many of the fruit we love would be vulnerable.
