

Compound Subjects and Compound Verbs

Compound Subjects

- A sentence containing more than one subject is said to have a compound subject.
- A **compound subject** is two or more subjects that have the same verb and are joined by a conjunction such as ***and*** or ***or***.

Examples of Sentences with compound subjects:

Cats and **kittens** are popular as pets.

She and **I** will feed the cat.

Cats, dogs and other **pets** can learn to live together.

Compound Verbs

- A compound verb is two or more verbs that have the same subject and are joined by a conjunction such as ***and*** or ***or***.

Example Sentences with Compound Verbs:

Kittens **sleep, eat** and **play**.

I have to **feed** the cat and **walk** the dog.

The cat **yawned, settled** into the blanket, and **fell** asleep.

Sometimes a sentence will have a compound subject and a compound verb.

Example:

The house and the garden **face** the lake and **are protected** by hedges.
